## SACRED SNAPSHOTS

In celebration of FCC's 190th Anniversary, longtime member Chris Godard generously offered to share some of his favorite memories of our church. The following is the final installment of Chris' recollection of times past.



### MEMORIES OF MEMBERS

Amongst the throngs of people in church back in the day, a number of them affected my life and the life of my family throughout the years. A few notable folks really stand out when I think of my youth. One member with a big personality was Jimmy (James) Wise. He was a songwriter and playwright who wrote the story "Dames at Sea" into a play. Whenever Jimmy would come back from New York he would often visit our church. Thanks to Jimmy, we now have an upgraded Casavant organ. Another fellow I remember from my youth is Glenn (Speed) Bosworth. Speed would often share his stories about baseball with us kids gathered around in the Narthex. Why did we listen to him? He not only coached for various Akron Youth baseball teams, but was also a scout for the Cleveland Indians. Boy, baseball nuts like me like to pick his brain most Sundays after church on the trades and line-ups. I can probably thank in part, Speed for becoming such a fan of the game. And I found a girl who gets just as excited about baseball as I do - that's my Sue!

There were so many families at First Church who affected my life- Mark (Kookie) Kucheman and his parents, Underwoods who built soap box derby cars, Carl and Marjorie Beecher (Margaret Maurer's parents) who both played in the Akron Symphony Orchestra. Then there were Frank and Barb Leonard. They were active in everything and, along with their children, put on the play *Alice in Blunderland*, which referred to nuclear arms. Harold and June Hibbard were the church. Same goes for the Nowels family. Irv Nowels knew everything about our boilers and was the original wassail maker at Christmas. Betty, Margaret, Sue and parents would join me, Uncle Fred and Aunt Bett Godard to go up to Michigan for several summers. The Lemmons had my two sisters, Laura and Anne, as camp counselors at the Greenberry Day

Camp. Boy did Betty Lemmon run it! Uncle Fred provided the vans from his dealership for transporting the campers. The Babcox's, who were into publishing, joined me on day and night hikes of our local Sierra Club. Bill Williams, Sue's uncle, played a part in my early life. I remember both he and Cathy coming over to Pop's house after my Granny (Kitty Godard) died. They worked their tails off preparing food for people after the funeral. Bill was actively involved in Diaconate with me later on. So many families played a part in my life- the Burroughs, Berrys, Burridges, Nygaards, Clarks, Grants, Nicelys, Rothmans, and a couple of unique Wilsons. The Tolleys (whose son Jim shared church classrooms with me) all became special to me and my family. See me for some individual stories.

### MEMORIES OF MINISTERS

I really need to mention a couple of ministers who became friends of mine and my family. John Deuble was there for me when I had a traumatic auto accident years ago. Dr. Charles Hugh Stem gave me my first red Bible in fourth grade. He was also there for my confirmation class and my grandparents' funerals. I asked him toward the end of his life to help celebrate a new life for me. Yes, I asked him and his wife Jean to be a part of my wedding to Sue. I had Dr. Stem use that very red Bible from fourth grade. He shared some verse from that Bible. It really meant the world to me that some things do come full circle.

8. We were able to give him some cooking essentials as well as food. Just an example of the need we sometimes see The Numbers: We took the time a couple of weeks ago to weigh the amounts of food that the Pantry provides to small, medium and large families. Projecting out, the Pantry averages giving out more than 3,000 lbs. of food every week X 52 weeks = 156,000 lbs./year or 78 TONS of food! Delving a little deeper, we see ... rapidly increasing need ... the Pantry served over 120 families in each of the last two weeks.



Current needs include: Almost any personal care items (such as bar soap, shampoo, body wash, etc.), household supplies (paper towels, TP, dish detergent, all cleaning products, etc.) The Pantry can also use reusable bags, plastic grocery bags and suitcases with wheels to assist families in taking their groceries home.


### ANNUAL MEETING & ICE CREAM SOCIAL
