## **PASSWORDS**

In today's digital world, protecting our personal information is just as important as locking our front doors. Many of us use the internet for email, banking, shopping,

or even connecting with family. That's why using strong passwords (and changing them regularly) is so important.

Think of your password like the key to your house. If it's too simple (like "123456") it's easy for someone to break in. A strong password should be at least 12 characters long and include a mix of letters, numbers, and symbols. Try using a phrase you'll remember, like "ILove2Walk@Sunset!"

It's also wise to change your passwords every few months. And never use the same one for everything; if one account gets hacked, the rest are at risk too.

Be cautious of suspicious emails or texts, especially those asking for personal information or urging you to click a link. Scammers often pretend to be banks, delivery companies, or even your pastor. When in doubt, don't click, call the organization directly instead.

Staying safe online doesn't require fancy technology, just a few good habits. Protecting your digital life helps you stay connected and secure!

# KIOSK

Our new Giving Kiosk by the church office is always available to make tithing more convenient for everyone. It's a safe, secure way to give, especially helpful for those who no longer carry cash or checks as often.

Using the kiosk is simple. It has a touchscreen where you can choose the amount you'd like to give and whether it's a one-time gift or a regular donation. You can use a debit or credit card, and your information is kept secure, just like at a store checkout.

If you're unsure about using the kiosk, don't worry, anyone in the office can help guide you through the process. No one will see how much you give, and a receipt will be emailed for your records.

A few reminders: never share your PIN or card info with anyone, and always double-check the screen before completing a transaction. If you receive emails or texts asking for donations that seem odd, it's best to call the church office before clicking any links.

# MEETINGHOUSE DOME ROOF REPAIR UPDATE #2

We are pleased to share that the project has made excellent progress and is nearing completion. Late September brought the start of the copper roof installation. After several weeks of work, the copper roof has been completed. One remaining step,



adding foam insulation and a venting fan to guard against condensation and rot, will be done in November.



As a reminder, the protective tarping over the dome will remain place through the winter months as an added precaution. Come spring, once we confident the repairs have weathered the season well, the tarping will be removed.
